Nature Notes for Winter 2020

As we near the 2nd of December we can look forward to some of the restrictions imposed upon us being lifted. Even so the latest lockdown regulations allow unlimited time for exercise and recreation as well as the possibility of travelling short distances for that purpose.

Autumn 2020 was one of the best that I can remember for seeds and berries. I have never seen so many acorns and conkers and some of the profusion of sloes (blackthorn berries) ended up in my Kilner Jars to make sloe gin.

Apart from the odd Chiffchaff which will likely over-winter here, the breeding summer migrants have long since departed, but they have been replaced by birds from Scandinavia and northern Europe, some of which ae just passing through on their journey south, but others finding our climate relatively mild will winter here. Fieldfares, Redwings and continental Blackbirds arrived before the end of September. The thin seeping call of Redwings, nocturnal migrants, could be heard at night and they were soon joined, and massively outnumbered by flocks of the larger Fieldfares. About the size of a Mistle Thrush, the Fieldfare has a harsh chattering call and in addition to berries, they have an appetite for fruit such as Apples and Pears. Much harder to find is the Woodcock; a wading bird that prefers woodlands to marshes and uses its long bill to probe for invertebrates in the leaf litter. I was lucky to see two birds during a recent walk in Temple Wood,

one of which remained unseen until it sprang up from almost under my feet.

Other birds that winter around here, away from their normal habitats, in small numbers include Stonechats, a colourful relation of the Robin that nests on heaths and moors and the Grey Wagtail which nests near fast flowing mountain streams.

Look out for egrets too. Little Egrets are regularly observed in our fens and just the other day I watched an enormous Great White Egret flying along Rippingale Beck.

If you traverse the road between Rippingale and Dunsby it is worth scanning the resident flock of Greylag and Canada Geese that often graze in the pastures next to the reservoir. Recently they were joined by two Barnacle Geese and in past winters both Pink-footed and White-fronted Geese have dropped in to join them. Apart from Hedgehogs and Bats, which hibernate, most of our mammals are active during the winter. If you don't get Muntjac Deer in your garden, then a visit to Callan's Lane or Temple Wood should produce sightings in addition to the numerous and much larger Fallow Deer.

By the time we get to Christmas we should see Snowdrops blooming in our gardens and hedgerows and we will know that Spring is not too far behind.

Enjoy our lovely countryside, stay safe and well.

Coronavirus Support. Depending on Government guidance on containing and eradicating the COVID-19 virus, the Village Coronavirus Support Group will continue its operations as long as required. It links with the Lincolnshire County Council and South Kesteven District Council support networks. These local volunteers have been assisting vulnerable and elderly residents, who are self-isolating due to COVID-19. This help includes picking up supplies, posting mail, collecting prescriptions, gardening and assistance with pets. The volunteers are also there for a friendly phone call. Coronavirus lock down measures. Due to Government requirements the Tennis Court remains closed until further notice. Additionally, social distancing and cleaning measures should be observed when using the play equipment on the Playing Field. Finally, there should be no meetings of groups on the Playing Field. These measures are in place to assist in combatting the spread of coronavirus.

Scams. Scams take many forms and appear to be on the increase due to the coronavirus lockdown. They can be unsolicited telephone calls detailing spurious offers or requesting bank details etc. Or they can be cold calling at properties, with for example false offers of supposedly required work at exorbitant prices. Police advice is to reject any such soliciting; telephone calls can be blocked through software set up by your provider and any unwarranted or aggressive cold calling should be reported to the Police via 101.

Vacancy for a Parish Councillor. There is currently a vacancy for a Parish Councillor. If you are interested in contributing to the life of the village, and would like greater information, please contact the Parish Clerk. To be eligible, you must be over 18, on the electoral role and have lived or worked within 3 miles of the Parish for at least 12 months.

Neighbourhood Plan. Work on the Rippingale Neighbourhood Plan continues and liaison on its completion is underway with our consultants. It will be subject to a pre-submission consultation with Village residents, then reviewed by SKDC, before it is sent for independent examination and then a Referendum arranged. This cannot be before May 2021 due to Coronavirus restrictions. Mike Hallas, who as Operations Officer, has been instrumental in formulating the Plan to this stage, has decided to withdraw from the Steering Group. We wish him well and thank him for his great contribution.

Village entrance signposts. The custom-made Village signposts were designed and erected over 15 years ago and after good service, appear to be in need of replacement. The Parish Council is considering new gateway type alternatives as an attractive entrance to the Village.



Placed on both sides of the main entry roads these would visibly highlight early entry into the Village, aiding speed control. Comments on this proposal are welcomed; please forward these to rippingalepc@gmail.com.
